RE: Pre-Authorization Request — 2011 PAC 12056

Dear Ms. Cummings:

We have received and reviewed the written notice from the Vernon Hills Police Department of its intention to deny disclosure of certain information pursuant to Section 7(1)(c) of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). 5 ILCS 140/1 *et seq.*, as amended.

██████████ submitted a FOIA request dated January 12, 2011, seeking various police reports. In its written notice, the Department asserted that home addresses, dates of birth and medical information are exempt from disclosure under Section 7(1)(c) of FOIA.

The home addresses the Department redacted fall within the Section 7(1)(b) exemption for private information. "Private information" means unique identifiers, including a person's social security number, driver's license number, employee identification number, biometric identifiers, personal financial information, passwords or other access codes, medical records, home or personal telephone numbers, and personal email addresses. Private information also includes home address and personal license plates, except as otherwise provided by law or when compiled without possibility of attribution to any person." 5 ILCS 140/7(1)(b).

Use of this exemption to partially deny disclosure of public records does not require preapproval from our Office.

**Determination**

Section 7(1)(c) of FOIA exempts from inspection and copying "[p]ersonal information contained within public records, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, unless disclosure is consented to in writing by the individual subjects of the information." 5 ILCS 140/7(1)(c). The exemption defines "[u]nwarranted invasion of personal privacy" as "the disclosure of information that is highly personal or objectionable to a reasonable

person and in which the subject's right to privacy outweighs any legitimate public interest in obtaining the information." *Id.*

The Department's use of the exemption in Section 7(1)(c) with regard to dates of birth is approved. We have determined that the disclosure of dates of birth would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy under Section 7(1)(c). 5 ILCS 140/7(1)(c). This type of information is highly personal by its very nature and the subject's right to privacy outweighs any legitimate public interest in disclosing this information. Therefore, the Department has met its initial burden demonstrating that the redacted information is exempt under Section 7(1)(c).

The Department's use of the exemption in Section 7(1)(c) with regard to medical information is approved. We have determined that the disclosure of this information would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy under Section 7(1)(c). 5 ILCS 140/7(1)(c). This type of information is highly personal by its very nature and the subject's right to privacy outweighs any legitimate public interest in disclosing this information. Therefore, the Department has met its initial burden demonstrating that the redacted information is exempt under Section 7(1)(c).

As such, the Department may issue a partial denial letter directly to the requester and release the records with the appropriate information redacted.
