RE: Pre-Authorization Request — 2010 PAC 12427

Dear Trooper Sutton:

We have received and reviewed the written notice from the Illinois State Police of its intention to deny disclosure of certain information pursuant to Section 7(1)(c) of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). 5 ILCS 140/1 et seq., as amended.

submitted a FOIA request dated February 7, 2011, seeking police records. In its written notice, the ISP asserted that dates of birth and victim names are exempt from disclosure under Section 7(1)(c) of FOIA.

Determination

Section 7(1)(c) of FOIA exempts from inspection and copying "[p]ersonal information contained within public records, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, unless disclosure is consented to in writing by the individual subjects of the information." 5 ILCS 140/7(1)(c). The exemption defines "[u]nwarranted invasion of personal privacy" as "the disclosure of information that is highly personal or objectionable to a reasonable person and in which the subject's right to privacy outweighs any legitimate public interest in obtaining the information." *Id*.

The ISP's use of the exemption in Section 7(1)(c) with regard to victim names is approved. We have determined that the disclosure of these names would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy under Section 7(1)(c). 5 ILCS 140/7(1)(c). This type of information is highly personal by its very nature and the subject's right to privacy outweighs any legitimate public interest in disclosing this information. Therefore, the ISP has met its initial burden demonstrating that the redacted information is exempt under Section 7(1)(c).

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The ISP's use of the exemption in Section 7(1)(c) with regard to dates of birth is approved. We have determined that the disclosure of dates of birth would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy under Section 7(1)(c). 5 ILCS 140/7(1)(c). This type of information is highly personal by its very nature and the subject's right to privacy outweighs any legitimate public interest in disclosing this information. Therefore, the ISP has met its initial burden demonstrating that the redacted information is exempt under Section 7(1)(c). As such, the ISP may issue a partial denial letter directly to the requester and release the records with the appropriate information redacted.
